## BUILDING INFORMATION

**DRESS CODE:** While fashion changes, the reason for being in school doesn't. Students are in school to learn. Any fashion (dress, accessory or hairstyle) that disrupts the educational process or presents a safety risk will not be permitted. Personal expression is permitted within these general guidelines.

- Clothing should be so constructed and worn in such a manner that is not unduly revealing. Halter tops, tank tops, midriff tops, very short mini-skirts or shorts and other garments of this nature are not acceptable.
- Swimwear, cut-off jeans, jogging or gym shorts are not permitted.
- Shirts and blouses are to be buttoned.
- Hair shall be neat, well groomed and not unnecessarily long. Boys are to be clean-shaven.
- Hats shall not be worn by boys or girls in the building.
- Shoes that provide sanitary protection and safety for the feet must be worn at all times. **No flip flops allowed.**
- No article of clothing shall be worn that distracts from the educational process. Shorts and slacks are to be worn at the waist. "Sagging" is not permitted.
- No article of clothing shall be worn which defames any person, the school, the community or the nation.
- No article of clothing shall be worn that is associated with alcoholic beverages, tobacco, drugs or encourages violence.
- No article of clothing shall be worn that contains obscene, profane, sex related words or pictures, or offensive sayings.
- Chains are not to be worn.

## **LUNCH PROCEDURES**

**Breakfast:** Canal Winchester Schools provides an optional breakfast program. Further information is available from Chartwells Dining Services at 920-2649.

Elementary students may put money on their lunch accounts. Checks may be made payable to Indian Trail Elementary. Please put your child's first and last name, teacher's name and grade on the check. Or, you may visit us at <http://www.CafePrepay.com>.

**Free and Reduced Lunch Program:** The free and reduced lunch program is available to students who qualify for participation as regulated by federal and state guidelines. For more information, contact the school cafeteria at 920-2718.

**Lunch Charge Policy:** The Canal Winchester Local School District has adopted a "no charge" policy for student lunches. School lunches may be prepaid in advance by buying a lunch ticket or they may be paid for on a daily basis. Any child who does not have lunch money will be given the opportunity to contact their parent/guardian. In the event that a student is unable to secure funds to pay for lunch, an alternate lunch of a sandwich and milk will be provided to the student. This alternate lunch will only be offered a maximum of three times during a grading period, at which point the child will be given nothing to eat. In the event of an emergency, the building principal can waive this rule.

**RECESS PROCEDURES:** Students will go out for recess weather permitting, however, they will stay in if the temperature is below 35 degrees and/or the wind chill is below 25 degrees. Please dress your child appropriately.

**GUIDANCE SERVICES:** School counselors are available to talk with individuals or small groups about their academic, personal or social concerns. The counselor assists students in discussing feelings, sorting out difficulties, problems and exploring options. Referring a student for additional help will be made as necessary. Other opportunities for the learning of important information to assist students may include classroom visits and/or small group counseling, where such topics may be covered: student and organizational skills, communication skills, problem-solving & decision making, character education, and conflict resolution.

**MEDIA CENTER GUIDELINES:** The mission of the media center is to ensure that students and staff are effective users of ideas and information. To achieve this mission, the certified library media specialist will provide physical and intellectual access to all types of information, promote ethical behavior concerning the use of information, demonstrate that reading serves many purposes, and provide students with the necessary skills to conduct research. The media center maintains an open schedule during the school day to accommodate students, staff, and community members. Patrons are expected to respect library property, to use electronic and print resources appropriately, and to abide by the Student Code of Conduct rules when visiting the media

center. Patrons assume full responsibility for materials borrowed from the media center. Overdue notices will be sent to students each grading period. Fees will be charged for damaged and lost items. The use of the media center is a privilege that may be suspended or revoked.

### SCHOOL ATTENDANCE POLICY

**ATTENDANCE PHILOSOPHY:** Indian Trail is committed to providing a formal quality education to its students. To achieve this goal, students must attend school in a consistent manner. Continuity in the learning process is seriously disrupted by excessive absences. Make-up work cannot substitute adequately for classroom interaction. Students must attend school regularly if they are to derive benefits from educationally sound activities such as:

- Class discussion and group activities
- Dialogue between students and teachers
- Lectures
- Hands on experiences
- Quizzes and tests
- Educational videos
- Special instruction and individual help

The State of Ohio Revised Code, 3321.04, Compulsory Attendance states: "Every parent of any child of compulsory age who is not employed under the Age and School Certificate must send such child to a school or special education program that conforms to the minimum standards as prescribed by the State Board of Education. The child must attend the full time that school is in session. The primary responsibility for school attendance is placed with the student and then with the parent/guardian. The parent/guardian is responsible for permitting only those absences that can be excused under the recommendations of the State Department of Education and Canal Winchester Schools. Any student who does not maintain good attendance may fail, lose certain privileges, and/or have their parents taken to court. Please review the attendance guidelines below to avoid these negative consequences.

**ATTENDANCE DEFINITIONS:** **Habitual truant** means any child of compulsory school age who is absent without legitimate excuse from the public school the child is supposed to attend for five or more consecutive school days, seven or more school days in one school month, or twelve or more school days in a school year (Ohio Revised Code 2151.011). **Chronic truant** means any child of compulsory school age who is absent without legitimate excuse from the public school the child is supposed to attend for seven or more consecutive school days, ten or more school days in one school month, or fifteen or more school days in a school year (Ohio Revised Code 2152.02). **The school year** shall begin on the first day of July of each calendar year and close on the thirtieth day of June of the succeeding calendar year. A school week shall consist of five days, and a school month of four school weeks (Ohio Revised Code 3313.63).

**Notification of Absence:** State law requires parents to call and notify the school office, BEFORE 9:30 a.m. on each day of their child's absence. If prior contact is not possible, the parents should provide a written excuse within two days of the absence. When no excuse is provided, the absence will be unexcused and the student will be considered truant. If the absence of a student appears to be questionable or excessive, the school staff will try to help

parents improve their child's attendance. Students arriving at school more than one hour late, but less than three hours late, will be considered ½ day absent. Students arriving more than three hours late will be counted one full day absent. Parents are encouraged to schedule their child's appointments during non-school hours to the extent possible.

**Tardiness: Punctuality is very important.** Each student is expected to be in his/her assigned location throughout the school day. **If a student is late in arriving at school, s/he must physically be walked in by the parent/guardian and signed in at the office.** If a note is brought to the office on the day of or the day following the tardiness, the tardiness will be excused for personal illness, medical appointments with a doctor's note, family or home emergency, severe weather, and other as approved by the principal.

**Excessive Tardiness:** Chronic tardiness is unacceptable. A student is considered a chronic truant if they are tardy without legitimate excuse for five or more consecutive school days, seven or more days in a month, or twelve or more days in a school year.

**Excusable, Approved Absences (per Ohio Revised Code):** Personal illness, family illness, quarantine of the home, death of a relative, funerals or weddings, observance of a religious holiday. Exceptional cases as in the judgment of the principal constitutes a good and sufficient cause for absence from school such as conventions, court, 4-H at fairs or other activities of a school nature, and approved family vacations. An excused absence allows a student to make up all possible work. It is the responsibility of the student to obtain missed assignments. It is possible that certain kinds of schoolwork such as labs or skill-practice sessions cannot be made up and, as a result may negatively impact a student's grade. The skipping of classes or any part of the school day is considered an unexcused absence and no make up work will be permitted. Disciplinary action will follow.

**Excusable, Non-Approved Absence:** If a student is absent from school because of suspension, the absence will not be considered a truancy, and s/he may be given the opportunity to make up the school work that is missed. (1<sup>st</sup> Out-Of-School Suspension Only)

**Unexcused, Non-Approved Absences:** Any student who is absent from school for all or any part of the day without a legitimate excuse shall be considered truant and the student and his/her parents shall be subject to the truancy laws of the state. The following are some, but not all, reasons for unexcused absences: tardy, unapproved vacations, oversleeping, car trouble, missing the school bus or ride to school, shopping, hair appointment, and early dismissals. No credit shall be given for any school work not completed as a result of truancy. Once a student has **5 days of unauthorized absences**, the student may be referred to the county attendance officer. **NOTE: A student may not attend after school or evening functions if he/she has been absent that day.** A student is considered a habitual truant if s/he is absent without legitimate excuse for five or more consecutive school days, seven or more days in a month, or twelve or more school days in a school year.

**EARLY DISMISSAL:** If a student needs to be dismissed from school before the end of the school day, s/he must:

- Have a written request from his/her parent/guardian stating the reason for the early dismissal
- Parent/guardian must sign their child out in the office.
- Submit proper document as stated below the next school day

**The following the ONLY reasons for an excused early dismissal from school:**

- Doctor/Dentist appointment – you must provide a doctor's note upon returning to school the following day
- Going out of town – must be approved in advance
- Court/court related matter – must provide a related court document
- Emergency circumstances – must provide a parent note

**Failure to provide the required note may result in an unexcused dismissal.**

**Unexcused early dismissals:** The following are some, but not all, reasons for unexcused early dismissals: avoiding traffic, shopping, hair appointments, and unapproved vacations. Unexcused early dismissals are considered partial day absences and can be counted as truancy. Excessive dismissals may result in a referral to the county attendance officer.

**Make Up Tests and Other School Work:** Any student with an excused absence from school or who has been suspended (**1<sup>st</sup> suspension only**), shall be given the opportunity to make up work that has been missed. The student should contact their teacher as soon as possible to obtain assignments. **A period of one day per day of absence will be given to make up the work.** If a student misses a test due to an excused absence, s/he may make arrangements with the teacher to take the test. If s/he misses a Proficiency Test or other standardized test, the student should consult their guidance counselor to make arrangements to take the test. **For the best performance, it is highly recommended that students be present during the scheduled Proficiency Test dates and regular classroom tests.**

**Need of Additional Verification for Absence:** A student's absences from school are excused by parent notification alone for a maximum of nine days. All other absences from school may require additional verification or notification in order to be considered excused (i.e. a doctor's note). The principal or designee review documentation other than parent notes provided for the purpose of excused absences from school. Pre-approved absences are considered part of the nine days. If the school does not receive appropriate notification, the absence will be considered unexcused. Parents/guardians are still required to notify the school office by 9:30 a.m. when a student is absent. All notification of absences from school must be provided to the school attendance office within two school days of the student's return to school. **If notification is not provided within this time period, the absence will be unexcused.** When a student exceeds twenty days of absence, excused and/or unexcused, the child may be considered for retention.

**Vacation during the School Year:** Permission for an excused future absence must be requested in writing at least **one week** prior to the absence. **The recommended maximum number of excused vacation days for the year is five.** This applies to family vacations, trips, etc. during the school year. Responsibility for making up work lies with a student as follows: All homework that can be completed prior to the excused absence is to be done before leaving school, all work assigned during the absence is to be completed and turned in upon returning to school, and all work not assigned before leaving must be made up within the maximum of five days or one day per absence.

**TELEPHONE USE:** The school telephones may be used for emergencies with permission from the principal, assistant

principal, teacher or secretary. Student cell phones are prohibited during school hours.

**BICYCLES, FLOWERS, BALLOONS, INVITATIONS:**

Students will not be allowed to ride bicycles to school. We kindly request that parents and friends do not deliver balloons or flowers to students during the school day. Invitations passed out at school must include the entire class, or they will need to be mailed.

**LOST AND FOUND:** The lost and found is located under the steps of the kindergarten/1<sup>st</sup> grade wing. If a student finds something that is not theirs, please turn it into the office or place it in the lost and found basket. If you have lost an item, please check the areas of the school and the office for assistance. After each grading period, unclaimed items are removed from the school and given to charity. **At the end of the school year, items will be kept for ONE week. After that time, they will be discarded.**

## **STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT**

Although these rules are listed to provide to cover most situations, they in no way should be thought of as an exclusive list. Any action deemed to interfere with safety or the educational process can be punished at the discretion of the principal, assistant principal or teacher.

**Assault and Fighting:** A student shall not attempt to provoke, participate, or behave in such a way as to endanger any school official, personnel, student, visitor or staff. This includes any unauthorized touching of another, which could create fear, distress, or injury in or to that person.

**1<sup>st</sup> Offense** - Three days out of school suspension **2<sup>nd</sup> Offense** - Five days out of school suspension **3<sup>rd</sup> Offense** - Ten days out of school suspension

**Actions of this nature towards any staff member will be treated more severely, including a recommendation for expulsion.**

**Bullying:** A student shall not make statements or behave in a manner in an attempt to intimidate, coerce or taunt other students. Examples could include engaging in name-calling, taunting, making threats, and hazing. Additionally, student who uses school resources to bully via email or use instant messaging, or text such statements on school grounds (cyber bullying) shall be deemed to have acted as if they made such statements in person.

**1<sup>st</sup> Offense** – Lunch-time detention **2<sup>nd</sup> Offense** – Before School Detention **3<sup>rd</sup> Offense** – 1-day Alternative Educational Setting **4<sup>th</sup> Offense** – 3-days Out of School Suspension

**Severe offenses will be treated on a case-by-case basis and punishment can include a recommendation for expulsion.**

**Cheating:** A student will not cheat or plagiarize another's work. This also includes theft of information including copyright infringement & unauthorized duplication.

**1<sup>st</sup> Offense** – Conference with Principal **2<sup>nd</sup> Offense** – Before School Detention **3<sup>rd</sup> Offense** - Three (3) day out of school suspension

**Student will also receive a zero "0" for the assignment /test with no possibility for make-up.**

**Damage Or Theft To School Or Private Property:** A student shall not cause or attempt to cause damage to any or all property that is under the care of the school district. A student shall not steal or attempt to steal any item. Parents of students in violation of this rule will be liable for the replacement cost of damaged/stolen property.

**Minor 1st Offense** – Lunch-time detention **Minor 2nd Offense** – Before School Detention **Minor 3rd Offense** – Before School Detention & Parent Conference

Major offenses will be taken on a case-by-case basis with punishments including out-of-school suspension.

**Dangerous Weapons and Instruments:** A student shall not possess or attempt to possess, handle, transmit, or conceal any object which may be judged as a weapon or an instrument of potential danger to the individual or others. It may also include any toy that is presented as a real weapon or reacted to as a real weapon or an object converted from its original use to an object used to threaten or injure another. **Section 2923.122 of the Ohio Revised Code makes it a felony for any person to knowingly convey, attempt to convey, or possess any deadly weapon or dangerous ordinance onto any property owned, controlled or actively held under the auspices of a school.**

**1st Offense** – Up to ten days (10) out of school suspension and recommendation to the superintendent for an expulsion. In some cases the recommendation for an expulsion from school would be for one calendar year

**Disruption Of School:** A student shall not, by the use of violence, force, coercion, threat, profanity toward another student a staff member or by any other method cause disruption, obstruction, or any other interference with the educational process.

**Major 1st Offense** – Up to ten (10) day out of school suspension with a recommendation for an expulsion

**NOTE: Charges with the law enforcement may be filed by the school employee or students involved.**

**Disruption/Vandalism of District's Computer Network:** A student shall not knowingly attempt to disrupt operations of the computer network by "hacking" into or vandalizing the network resources. This may include but is not limited to malicious attempts to:

- hack, alter, harm or destroy any software, hardware or data;
- upload, download, create or transmit any computer virus, worm, Trojan horse or other harmful component or corrupted data;
- gain access to other users files and information;
- disrupt or degrade the operation of the network through any means intended for that purpose
- **1st Offense** – Taken on a case-by-case basis, punishment can include a recommendation for expulsion

**Unauthorized Access/Inappropriate Use of the Computer Network:** A student shall only attempt to gain access to the computer network using his/her assigned user account and password. Students shall also abide by the rules of Netiquette and proper use as set forth in the district's Acceptable Use Policy.

**1st Offense** – warning **2nd Offense** – lunch-time detention, parents formally contacted **3rd Offense** – before school detention and/or modification of network rights (including the revocation of these rights).

**Dress and Grooming Code:** Students are expected to adhere to the Dress and Grooming Code.

**1st Offense** - warning and request change of clothes **2nd Offense** - request change of clothes or sent home

**Repeated Offense** - may result in an **Alternative Educational Placement**

**Electronics:** Radios, Walkmans, iPods, MP3 players, beepers or related electronic games are prohibited during school hours except for emergency reasons or special cases with the principal's approval.

**1st Offense** – warning – child may pick the device up at the end of the day from teacher **2nd Offense** – child must pick up device from principal

**3rd Offense** – Parent must pick up device from principal **4th Offense** – Confiscate and morning detention

**Endangering:** A student shall not engage in acts such as pushing, throwing of objects, or other similar acts which in the judgment of the school personnel results in injury.

**1st Offense** – Three (3) lunch-time detentions **2nd Offense** - Five (5) lunch-time detentions **3rd Offense** – One (1) day out of school suspension.

**Severe actions of endangering may result in multiple day suspensions, even if it is a child's first offense.**

**Fire:** A student shall not attempt to use fire in any unauthorized manner or pull a false fire alarm.

**1st Offense** - Ten (10) days out of school suspension and recommendation to the superintendent for an expulsion and legal action will be sought

**Harassing And Disrespect:** No student shall harass, direct words or phrases, which are degrading, obscene, profane, slanderous or taunting toward others including students and staff.

**1st Offense** – One week lunch-time detention **2nd Offense** - One (1) day out of school suspension **3rd Offense** - Three (3) days out of school suspension

**4th Offense** - Ten (10) days out of school suspension and recommendation to the superintendent for an expulsion

**NOTE: Toward staff will be treated as a 2nd offense**

**Failure to Serve a Detention:** No student shall fail to serve a detention at the assigned time and date.

**Failure to serve – detention is converted to one (1) day out of school suspension**

**Accumulation of four detentions in a semester - One (1) day out of school suspension**

**Insubordination:** A student shall not refuse to respond to or carry out requests of any school personnel. Any action judged by a school official to involve misconduct and not specifically mentioned in any other rule may be judged as insubordination.

**1st Offense** - One (1) Lunch-time detention **2nd Offense** – One (1) day out of school suspension **3rd Offense** - Three (3) days out of school suspension

**\*\* If severe, an event of insubordination can be judged as a third offense**

**Narcotics, Alcoholic Beverages, And Drugs:** A student shall not attempt to possess, use, sell, transmit, or conceal narcotics, alcoholic beverages, drugs or drug paraphernalia unless prescribed for a specific medical purpose for that person and administered as per guidelines.

**1st Offense** - ten days (10) out of school suspension and recommendation to the superintendent for an expulsion with no waiver of suspension days

**2nd Offense** - ten days (10) out of school suspension & expulsion from school for a maximum of eighty (80) school days or the remainder of the semester, whichever is longer.

**NOTE:** Any student who is caught distributing, selling, or offering to sell drugs or alcohol on school grounds or at a school function away from school will be recommended for 2nd offense.

**Tobacco:** A student shall not use or possess tobacco or tobacco products (ex. snuff, chew) within any school bus, building, or on any school grounds.

**1st Offense** - One (1) day out of school suspension **2nd Offense** - Five (3) days out of school suspension **3rd**

**Offense** - Ten (10) days out of school suspension and recommendation to the superintendent for an expulsion

**Counterfeit Drugs:** A student shall not attempt to possess, sell, transmit, or be involved in any way with counterfeit controlled substances. Punishments have the same rule as narcotics.

**Removing or Altering School Records:** A student shall not remove or alter any student record, school forms, or correspondence.

**1st Offense** - One (1) lunch-time detention **2nd Offense** - One (1) day Alternative Educational Placement **3rd Offense** - Three (3) day out of school suspension

**NOTE:** This offense may be severe enough to warrant an out of school suspension and recommendation to the superintendent for an expulsion.

**Violation of Suspension:** A student shall not be on school premises or at any school activity, home or away, while under suspension. Additional suspension days will be assigned

**Repeated Offenses:** A student shall not repeatedly fail to comply with reasonable rules and regulations of the staff, school and school district.

If due to four (4) times receiving before school detentions in a semester – One (1) day out of school suspension. If due to 8 times receiving before school detentions in a semester – five (5) days out of school suspension

**Poor Behavior:** No student shall display poor behavior for a substitute teacher/approved chaperone or during an assembly, field trip or a tornado or fire drill.

**Social Behavior:** A student shall not engage in acts which are contrary to acceptable social behavior (indecent exposure, etc.).

**1st Offense** – Before School Detention **2nd Offense** – One (1) day out of school suspension **3rd Offense** – Three (3) day out of school suspension

**Truancy:** A student shall not be absent from school or a class without permission or proper authorization.

**1st Offense** – Before school detention **2nd Offense** – Two before school detentions **3rd Offense** – One-day in-school alternative placement.

**Unauthorized Entry:** A student shall not enter, or attempt to enter any school building or property without permission or enter a restricted area (boiler room, personal offices, etc.) without permission.

**1st Offense** – Warning **2nd Offense** – Lunch-time detention **3rd Offense** – Before School Detention

**Verbal Coersion:** No student shall by way of verbal threats of other non-physical actions force another person to engage in an action against their will.

**1st Offense** – One (1) lunch-time detention **2nd Offense** – Five (5) lunch-time detentions **3rd Offense** – One (1) day Out-of -School Suspension

\*\* Note: Incidents may be deemed serious enough for a first offense to be treated as a second or third offense.

**Any Other Action** judged by school officials to involve misconduct and not specifically mentioned in other sections may be dealt with as poor behavior. This includes bring a lighter to school or other device which could cause harm or be used to help commit and act that would violate this code of conduct. It also includes actions not specifically covered by this document that are serious and those minor in nature.

**Search and Seizure:** Search of a student and his/her possessions, including vehicles, may be conducted at any time the student is under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education, if there is a reasonable suspicion that the student is in violation of the law or school rules. (Policy 5771) A search may also be conducted to protect the safety of others. All searches may be conducted with or without a student's consent. Students are provided, desks and other

equipment including computers and network access in which to store materials. It should be clearly understood that this equipment is the property of the school district and may be searched at any time if there is reasonable suspicion that a student has violated the law or school rules. Locks are to prevent theft, not to prevent searches. Anything that is found in the course of the search that may be evidence of a violation of school rules or the law may be taken and held or turned over to the police. The school reserves the right not to return items that have been confiscated.

### **Emergency Removals**

1. The superintendent, the principal or their designee may remove a student from the classroom, extracurricular activity or the school premises for a period of no longer than 24 hours when the student's presence is considered to be dangerous to the student, other persons or property or disrupts the academic process.
2. A teacher may remove a student from the classroom or extracurricular activity but not from the premises for the reasons stated above. The teacher must submit the reasons for the removal in writing to the principal as soon as it is practical after the removal of the student.
3. A hearing must be held within 72 hours of the removal if the removal could extend for more than 24 hours.
4. Prior to the hearing, the student must be informed in writing of the hearing by the school officials. The person who ordered the removal must be present at the hearing. The student has the opportunity to appear and challenge the reason for removal. If the superintendent or the principal removes the student or other disciplinary action is taken, written notification must be given to the parent, guardian or custodian of the student within 24 hours of the hearing.

### **Suspension**

1. The superintendent or the principal may suspend a student from school.
2. The superintendent or the principal will give written notice of intent to suspend to the student, which enumerates the reason(s) for the intended suspension.
3. The suspension cannot exceed ten (10) days.
4. An informal hearing will be held before the superintendent or the principal or his/her designee. The student may challenge the reason(s) for the intended suspension and otherwise state his/her position concerning the matter.
5. The superintendent, the principal or his/her designee shall give notification of the decision to suspend in writing to the parents, guardian or the custodian of the student and the treasurer of the Board of Education within 24 hours of the suspension. The notice must include the reason(s) for the suspension and the right of the student or parent to appeal to the superintendent or his/her designee.
6. An appeal to suspension can be made to the superintendent or the superintendent's designee. The appeal must be in writing and submitted within 48 hours after notification of suspension. The appeal must contain the challenge to the reason(s) for the suspension and an explanation of the student's action.
7. A student may be kept from class, school or extracurricular activities until disposition of the matter.
8. In-school restriction and Saturday school may be an option to out of school suspension at the discretion of the principal. Students are expected to follow all rules in the Student Code of Conduct. The principal determines Saturday school and in-school restriction rules.

### **Expulsion**

1. The superintendent may expel a student from the school.
2. The superintendent or his/her designee shall notify the parents, guardian or custodian of the student of the intended expulsion.
3. The notice shall include the reasons for the intended expulsion and the right of the student, parents, guardian, custodian or representative to appear before the superintendent and challenge the reasons and explain the actions of the student.
4. The notice shall state the time and place at which the student or his/her representative may appear. The date of the hearing shall not be sooner than three days and not more than five days after the notice is given. The superintendent or his/her designee may grant an extension of time when requested by the student or his/her representative.
5. The student may be kept from school until disposition of the matter.

If the superintendent expels a student, he/she must notify the parent, guardian or custodian of the student and the treasurer of the Board of Education or its designee of the right to be represented at the appeal and the right to request the appeal to be heard in executive session.

### **Appeals to the Board Of Education**

1. A student or his/her parent, guardian or custodian may appeal the expulsion, suspension or removal to the Board of Education or its' designee.
2. The student or his/her representative will be granted a hearing before the Board of Education or its' designee to challenge the expulsion, suspension or removal.
3. The student may be represented at the appeal procedure.
4. A verbatim record of the appeal hearing must be kept by the Board of Education.
5. The Board of Education may confirm, reverse or modify the disciplinary action. This decision must be made in a public session only.
6. All appeals shall be made in writing and submitted forty-eight (48) hours after notification of expulsion.
7. The Board's decision may be appealed under Chapter 2506 of the Revised Code.

## **TRANSPORTATION INFORMATION**

**Bus Transportation to School:** Elementary transportation will be provided to students living beyond the established limited boundaries. The bus schedule and routes are available by contacting the Transportation Department at 833-2164. Transportation, beyond the limited boundaries, will be to and from the student's pick up point and school ONLY. If the bus is late, students will report to the office before going to their homeroom. Upon dismissal, all students are expected to board their buses immediately.

**School Bus Pass:** If a student is to depart from the bus to a residence other than their scheduled stop, a note must be sent from home to the elementary office. Please include the child's first name, last name, teacher's name, bus they will be riding and daytime phone number where a parent may be reached if there are any questions. Students will not be permitted to call and make arrangements at school to go anywhere other than their assigned stop. A bus pass will be issued only if there is space available on the individual bus requested. **It is the parent's responsibility to call the transportation office at 833-2164 to first check on the availability of space on the bus.**

**Bus Conduct:** Students are required to adhere to the following basic safety rules:

1. Students shall arrive at the bus stop before the bus is scheduled to arrive.
2. Students must wait in a location clear of traffic and away from the bus stop.
3. Behavior at the school bus stop must not threaten life, limb or property of any individual.
4. Students must go directly to their assigned seat and remain seated while the bus is in motion.
5. All aisles and exits must remain free and clear.
6. Students must observe classroom conduct and obey the driver promptly and respectfully.
7. The following items are prohibited on the bus: eating, drinking, tobacco, alcohol, drugs, animals, insects, glass and large objects that cannot be held on your lap.
8. Students must leave or board the bus at the location to which they have been assigned unless they have parental and administrative authorization to do otherwise.
9. Students crossing in front of the bus must wait for the hand signal from the driver.
10. Students must not throw or pass objects on, from or into the bus.
11. Students must not put their head or arms out of the bus windows.
12. Students are to be courteous and not destroy property.
13. Students are to follow the "feet on the floor, seat on the seat, back on the back" rule.

**Student and Parent Responsibilities:** Parents and pupils must assume that school bus transportation is a privilege to the student – not a right. Pupils will ride on assigned buses. Parents must request, in writing, to permit deviation from this rule. Requests shall be made to the elementary and transportation offices. Pupils will ride their assigned bus both to and from home unless a written request signed by the parents asking permission to be let off the bus at some other stop is presented to the office. This note along with a bus pass issued by the office will be given to the driver by the student. Parents will assume responsibility of the child when such a request is made.

### **Penalties for Bus Infractions**

A student who becomes a behavior problem on the bus shall be disciplined in accordance with the Student Discipline Code and may be deprived the privilege of riding on the bus. The Board of Education has authorized the installation of video cameras on school buses for purposes of monitoring the student behavior. If a student is reported to have misbehaved on a bus and his/her actions were recorded on videotape, the tape will be submitted to the principal and may be used as evidence of the misbehavior. Since these tapes are considered part of a student's record, they can be viewed only in accordance with Federal law. The driver will report misconduct in writing to the principal. Violation of the rules will generally result in the following consequences:

**1<sup>st</sup> Offense = Lunch-time detention and notification of parents; 2<sup>nd</sup> Offense = 1 to 3 day removal from bus; 3<sup>rd</sup> Offense = 1 to 5 to day removal from the bus; 4<sup>th</sup> Offense = 5 to 10 day removal from the bus; 5<sup>th</sup> Offense = removal for the grading period, semester or remainder of the year.**

Extreme offenses may result in removal from the bus, school suspension or expulsion, even if on the first offense.

## DISTRICT INFORMATION

**EMERGENCY CLOSINGS AND DELAYS:** If the school must be closed or the opening delayed because of inclement weather or other conditions, the school will notify the radio and television stations as follows:

Morning Preschool – Cancelled – No classes

### **Schedule B – 2 hour delay**

Grades 9-12 School starts approximately 9:30 a.m.  
Grades 6-8 School starts approximately 9:45 a.m.  
Grades 3-5 School starts approximately 11:00 a.m.  
Grades 1-2 School starts approximately 10:55 a.m.  
Morning Kindergarten will be from 10:55 a.m. – 12:40 p.m.  
Afternoon Kindergarten will be from 1:55 p.m. – 3:40 p.m.  
Morning Preschool – Cancelled – No classes

**Grades 1-12, afternoon KG and afternoon PS will end at their regular time.**

**Early Dismissal** – Early dismissal for inclement weather will call for automatic cancellation of all after school activities.

**Cancellation of School Day** – All activities are automatically cancelled when school is cancelled and the building is closed for any outside activities.

**School Reach** – Canal Winchester Schools will be utilizing an automated phone system to notify parents of closings, delays, early dismissals, and other important announcements. This will be in addition to TV and radio notifications listed above.

**PARENTS NOTE:** Please go over alternate plans for school delays and early dismissals with your child at the beginning of the school year.

**FIRE, TORNADO AND LOCKDOWN DRILLS:** The school complies with all fire safety laws and will conduct fire drills in accordance with State law. Students will practice fire, tornado and lockdown drills throughout the year. Students are expected to become familiar with each drill and observe the procedures developed. Evacuation procedures are posted in each classroom.

**SCHOOL VISITATION:** All adult members of our community are welcome to visit the school. To avoid interruption of the educational process, students are not permitted to bring visitors to school. State law requires any

person visiting the school to report directly to the office. Parents are encouraged to keep open communication with all classroom teachers. Teachers have a regularly assigned period of time when conferences can take place. Any conference with teachers should be scheduled in advance and parents must report directly to the office upon entering the building. If a parent would like to observe a classroom, the Visitor's Guideline Form must be completed one day prior to visiting.

### **STUDENT FEES**

Kindergarten - \$23.00  
First grade - \$33.00  
Second grade - \$35.00

If you qualify, you may be eligible to have your child's school fees waived. Forms are available at the front office.

**NETWORK AND INTERNET GUIDELINES:** A computer network, which offers access to the Internet, is available to ALL students for educational purposes. Rules and guidelines for proper use of the network are set forth in the district's Acceptable Use Policy, located on the district's web page at <http://www.cwschools.org> or available upon request. Violation of this policy will result in disciplinary action as deemed appropriate.

**PERSONAL ITEMS:** Students are discouraged from bringing personal items (toys, balls, games, etc.) to school. Such items can become lost or damaged. The school will not assume responsibility for loss or damage. Students are **prohibited** from playing with such items as radios, Ipods, tape recorders, electronic games, pagers, and cellular telephones at school. **This list is not fully inclusive and the administration reserves the right to deny any other materials deemed inappropriate for school.**

**DIRECTORY INFORMATION NOTICE:** The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that Canal Winchester Schools, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories - names, addresses and telephone listings - unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent. If you do not want Canal Winchester Schools to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing. The District has designated the following as directory information: student's name, major field of study, dates of attendance, current grade level, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, height and weight of a member of an athletic team, date of graduation, honors and awards received, and the current and previous educational institution attended by the student. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the district to include this type of information in certain publications such as: a playbill, showing your students role in

drama or musical productions, yearbook, honor roll or other recognition list, and graduation programs.

**STUDENT RECORDS:** Teachers, counselors and administrative staff keep many student records. There are two basic kinds of records - confidential records and directory information. The Records Control Officer for the district is responsible for the processing and maintenance of all student records.

**Confidential records** contain education and behavioral information that has restricted access based on the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and Ohio law. This information can only be released with the written consent of the parents, the adult student or a surrogate. The only exception to this is to comply with State and Federal laws that may require release without consent. Included in the confidential records may be test scores, psychological reports, behavioral data, disciplinary actions and communications with the family and outside service providers. The school must have the parent's' written consent to obtain records from an outside professional or agency. Confidential information that is in a student's record that originates from an outside professional or agency may be released to the parent through the originator. Parents should keep copies of such records for their home file. Parents may also provide the school with copies of records made by non-school professional agencies or individuals. Information on former students also falls into directory and confidential information categories and will be made available on the same basis as enrolled students. Students and parents have the right to review educational records generated by the school district, request amendment to these records, insert addendum to records and obtain copies of such records. Copying costs may be charged to the requestor. If a review of records is wanted, please contact the building principal in writing stating the records desired. The records will be collected and an appointment will be made with the appropriate persons present to answer any questions there may be.

## **HEALTH AND WELLNESS**

**Immunizations:** Students attending school are required to have proof of immunizations against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis, chicken pox, tuberculosis testing if enrolling from a foreign country and any other immunization required by Ohio law and board policy. Those students not providing proof of required immunizations within fourteen calendar days of school attendance will be subject to exclusion. Any questions about exemptions or immunizations should be directed to the school health staff.

**Wellness Policy:** As required by law, the Canal Winchester Board of Education has established a Wellness Policy for the Canal Winchester Local School District. The board of education recognizes that good nutrition and regular physical activity affect the health and well-being of the district's students and staff. Therefore, each building has developed goals to establish good health and nutrition habits through nutrition education, physical activity and other school-based activities. Further information may be obtained from your building principal.

**Injuries and Illness:** Injuries – Injuries must be reported to a teacher or the office staff. If minor, the student will be treated and may return to class. If medical attention beyond the school health staff is required, the school emergency procedures will be followed. **Illness** – A student who becomes ill during the school day must request permission from the teacher to go to the clinic. The school health staff

will determine whether or not the student should remain in school or go home.

**Emergency Medical Authorization Forms:** State law requires that all students must have an Emergency Medical Authorization Form completed, signed by a parent/guardian, and filed in the school office. A student may be excluded from school until this requirement has been fulfilled. Emergency Medical Authorization Forms, provided upon school admission, are to be returned by the third day of school. Notify the school if any telephone numbers, address or contacts have been added or changed during the school year. No student will be released from school without parental permission unless a serious or life-threatening condition warrants transportation to an emergency room. A reasonable attempt to contact the parent/guardian prior to transport will be made.

**Conditions Requiring Exclusion from School:** The Ohio Department of Health has provided strict guidelines for preventing the spread of highly contagious infections in the school environment. These guidelines are meant to protect your child and others from unnecessary exposure to infectious or communicable organisms. If these conditions are found or suspected by the school health staff or office staff, a parent/guardian will be contacted to take the student home. A student should not be in school if any of the following conditions are present:

- Any contagious bacterial or fungal infection until treated with antibiotics for at least 24 hours including, but not limited to; strep throat, conjunctivitis, ringworm, skin infections and scarlet fever.
- Fever of 100 degrees F. or higher within 24 hours
- Vomiting or diarrhea within 24 hours
- Undiagnosed redness and secretions from the eye/s
- Head lice until school health staff examines for satisfactory treatment/removal of lice and nits
- Scabies, until initial treatment of an appropriate scabicide
- Impetigo, until there is no discharge and has been treated for 24 hours
- Chicken pox, until the 6th day after onset and until all sores (lesions) are dry, (students with shingles do not need to be excluded as long as sores are covered with clothing or bandages until sores have crusted)
- Undiagnosed rash – as per the guidelines submitted by the Ohio Department of Health, Division of Infectious Diseases, "all children sent to school with suspicious rashes must be excluded from school until the rash has been diagnosed by a physician"

### **Control of Casual Contact Communicable Diseases:**

Because schools have a high concentration of people, it is necessary to take specific measures when the health or safety of the group is at risk. The school's professional staff has the authority to remove or isolate a student who has been ill or has been exposed to a communicable disease. Specific diseases include, but not limited to; diphtheria, scarlet fever, strep infections, pertussis (whooping cough), mumps, measles, rubella, head lice and other conditions indicated by the local and state health departments. Any removal will be for the contagious period as specified in the school's administrative guidelines and per the department of health requirements.

### **Control of Non-Casual Contact Communicable Diseases:**

In the case of non-casual contact communicable diseases, the school has the obligation to protect the safety of the staff and students. In these cases, the person in question will have his/her status reviewed by a panel of resource people, including the County Health Department, to ensure that the rights of the person infected and those in contact with that person are respected. The school will seek

to keep students and staff in school unless there is definitive evidence to warrant exclusion. Non-casual contact communicable diseases include sexually transmitted diseases, AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome), ARC-AIDS Related Complex, Human-Immunodeficiency (HIV), Hepatitis B (HBV) and other diseases that may be specified by the State Board of Health. As requested by federal law, parents will be requested to have their child's blood checked for HIV and HBV when the child has bled at school and students and/or staff members have been exposed to the blood. Any testing is subject to laws protecting confidentiality.

**Use of Medications:** The Canal Winchester Board of Education shall not be responsible for the diagnosis and treatment of student illnesses. The administration of prescribed medication and/or medically prescribed treatments to a student during school hours will be permitted only when failure to do so would jeopardize the health of the student, the student would not be able to attend school if the medication or treatment were not made available during school hours or if the child is disabled and requires medication to benefit from his/her educational program. **For the safety of our students, the transportation of all medications to and from school is the responsibility of the parent/guardian.** For the purposes of this policy, "prescribed medication" shall include all medicines prescribed by a physician or licensed prescriber. Non-prescription medications shall include all age and/or weight appropriate over-the-counter drugs, preparations, and/or remedies. "Treatment" refers both to the manner in which a medication is administered and to health-care procedures that require special training, such as catheterization.

**Prescription Medications:** Before any prescription medication or treatment may be administered to any student during school hours, the Canal Winchester Board of Education requires the student's physician/licensed prescriber and parent/guardian to complete a Medication or Treatment Authorization Form. **The authorization form is required to be renewed each school year.** This document shall be kept on file in the school health clinic. Prescription medication must be in the original container, labeled with the date, student's name, prescriber's name and exact dosage. Staff designated by the superintendent may administer prescription medication or treatment as authorized in writing on the authorization form by a physician/licensed prescriber and parent/guardian. **All prescription medications must be stored and locked in the school health clinic.**

**Non-Prescriptions/Over-the-Counter Medications:** Students in **grades Preschool-5** may have over-the-counter medication if the required Non-Prescription Medication Authorization Form is completed, signed by the parent/guardian and on file in the school health clinic. All medications must be provided by the parent/guardian and will be stored in the school health clinic and *administered by authorized school personnel or the child's parent only.* Students in **grades 6-12** may **self administer** over-the-counter medications only when the Non-Prescription Medication Authorization Form is completed, signed by the parent/guardian and on file in the school health clinic.

**All medications are to be provided by the parent/guardian. Canal Winchester Local School District does not supply medications.** Non-prescription medications must be in the original container with the student's name, current expiration date, dosing guidelines to validate appropriate dose for age and/or weight. Examples of non-prescription medications that may be stored and administered at school are: Tylenol, Motrin, Advil, Benadryl, Tums, Maalox, cough drops, cold and cough medicines, and lactase products.

**Any medication or medical equipment remaining at the end of the school year will be discarded one week after the last day of school.**

**Health Screening Programs:** The Canal Winchester Local School District is continually concerned about the welfare and progress of children in the school. In an effort to consider your child's educational needs, the school conducts a variety of health screenings under the supervision of the school health staff and the speech/language pathologist to provide important information about each student. You will be notified if any of the screenings indicate problems or if there is a need for further medical advice. If you do not wish your child to participate in any of these screening programs, please contact the school immediately.

The evaluations that may pertain to your child (age and/or need appropriate) are listed below:

- speech/language screening
- hearing screening
- vision screening

In addition to these screenings, the nurse, school health staff and speech/language pathologist cooperate with students, teachers, parents, administrators, guidance counselors, community agencies, physicians and other pertinent professionals as deemed necessary.

**NOTICE OF NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY EQUAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY:**

The Board of Education will not discriminate nor tolerate harassment in its educational programs or activities for any reasons, including on the basis of religion, race, color, national origin, sex, disability or age. The Board is committed to providing an equal opportunity for all children to achieve their maximum potential through the curriculum offered in the District regardless of race, color, creed, disability, religion, gender, ancestry, age, national origin, place of residence, or social or economic background.

Any person who believes that the school or any staff member has discriminated against them has the right to file a complaint with the principal. Complaints will be investigated and a response provided to the person filing the complaint. Under no circumstances will the District threaten or retaliate against anyone who raises a complaint. For more information, reference Board Policies 2260, 5517, 5517.01 available on the web at [www.cwschools.org](http://www.cwschools.org).

**STUDENTS RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES:**

The Canal Winchester Board of Education, in compliance with state law, provides for the education of all school-age residents in the district. The school shall abide by all legal rights guaranteed to the students. Each student has a right to all education resources necessary to operate an instructional and extra-curricular program. Students in the school have the responsibility to act in such a way as not to interfere with the rights of others to the same educational opportunity. By accepting the right to participate in the school programs on or off school property, the student shall also accept the responsibility to conduct themselves according to the rules, regulations and provisions governing the operation of these programs. The school principal assumes responsibility for establishing and enforcing procedures necessary to ensure that students' rights are preserved and that the accompanying responsibilities are carried out. Students may forfeit certain rights when it can be demonstrated that they are not assuming their responsibilities.

**STUDENT RIGHTS OF EXPRESSION:** The school recognizes the right of students to express themselves. With

the right of expression comes the responsibility to do it appropriately. Students may distribute or display, at appropriate times, non-sponsored, noncommercial written material and petitions; buttons, badges, or other insignia; clothing, insignia, and banners; and audio and video materials. All items must meet school guidelines. Material cannot be displayed if it is obscene to minors, libelous, indecent, or unsanitary, advertises any product or service not permitted to minors by law, intends to be insulting, harassing or intimidating, or intends to incite fighting or presents a likelihood of disrupting school.

**STUDENT WELL-BEING:** Student safety is a responsibility of students and staff. All staff members are familiar with emergency procedures such as fire and tornado drills and accident reporting procedures. Should a student be aware of any dangerous situation or accident, he/she must notify any staff member immediately.

**INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES:** The Americans' With Disabilities Act (A.D.A) and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act provide that no individual be discriminated against on the basis of disability. This protection applies not just to the student, but all individuals who have access to the district's programs and facilities. The Canal Winchester School District provides a variety of special education programs and services for students identified as having a disability defined by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). A student can access special education services through the proper evaluation and placement procedure. Parent involvement in this procedure is required. More importantly, the school wants the parent to be an active participant. To inquire about the procedure or programs, a parent may contact the Director of Special Education at 920-2610.

**PHOTOGRAPHY/PUBLICATION DISCLAIMER:** During the course of the school year, pictures, videotapes, etc., containing your child's image may be used in newspaper articles, television stories, newsletters, brochures, school web pages, yearbooks, promotional products and other similar publications. If you **DO NOT** want your child's image published in the manner described above, please notify the office **in writing** as soon as possible and then verify with us that we have received your request. You must submit such a written notice to the office at the beginning of each school year.

**FIELD TRIPS:** Field trips are academic activities that are held off school grounds. There are also other trips that are part of the co-curricular program. No student may participate in any school-approved trip without parental consent. Student Code of Conduct rules apply to all field trips.

**STUDENT SALES:** Students may participate in only school-approved fundraisers when soliciting within the school. Items are not to be sold at school. **Money and/or merchandise are not to be exchanged between students for any reason.**

**HOMEWORK:** Homework will be assigned as part of the curriculum to extend and reinforce the school learning experience. Homework provides practice of skills, experience in data gathering, integration of knowledge, remedial assistance and development of independent work and judgment. The number, frequency and difficulty of homework assignment will be based on the ability and needs of a student.

**Student Responsibilities:** Keep an accurate list of all homework assignments/projects in a student plan book; find out what materials are expected to be used in the completion of homework assignments; set aside a time each evening for homework; turn completed assignments in on time; arrange a time with the teacher for needed extra instruction and inform parents when school supplies need to be replenished.

**Parent Responsibilities:** Encourage, motivate, prompt and question child regarding homework assignments and projects; check book bag to make sure things are organized; create a space to do homework; provide AND replenish required school supplies for home and school use and help your child set up a weekly calendar. This should include extra-curricular activities, family commitments, appointments and academic requirements.

**Teacher Responsibilities:** Encourage, motivate, prompt and question child regarding homework assignments and projects; homework assignments should not exceed 10 minutes per grade level of actual time on task. For example: second grade students should not have more than twenty minutes of homework for all subjects combined. This policy does not apply to long-term assignments. Categorize homework as preparatory, practice, extension or creative to help students see the purpose of the assignment; discuss and assess homework in a timely manner; send home reminder check sheets at the end of first semester and otherwise as needed for replenishing needed school supplies. No homework assignments will be scheduled during testing weeks, Thanksgiving break, winter break and spring break.

**Homework Request:** Homework assignments should only be requested when a student is absent **two or more** consecutive days. In order for the teacher to have the necessary time to acquire homework for absent students, parents need to call the office before 10:00 a.m. Homework will be ready for pick-up after school in the office. Homework, tests, reports, or projects that were assigned in advance of the absence are due upon returning, if no additional information or material was provided during the absence.

**PARENT/TEACHER CONFERENCES:** The elementary school will be holding scheduled conferences. Appointments are scheduled on a first come, first serve basis. **Since the conferences are only 15 minutes in length, they are meant only to be an initial opening to the lines of communication between the parent and teachers. If additional time is needed, arrangements can be made with the teachers.** Conferences for the school year will be held on the following dates:

- Thursday, September 1, 2011
- Thursday, September 8, 2011
- Thursday, November 3, 2011
- Friday, November 4, 2011 – KINDERGARTEN ONLY
- Thursday, March 15, 2011

**PROMOTION, RETENTION & PLACEMENT:** In making decisions concerning proper grade level assignment and/or promotion, the following areas will be taken into consideration: teacher assessment of student's progress, developmental age of student, social and emotional well being of the student, attendance, and test results. In cases of **retention**, the parent will be contacted in advance, although **the final decision will rest with the principal**,

with an appeal to the superintendent. Retention is viewed as another opportunity for growth at a particular level. **Placement** in the next grade may be noted on record rather than promotion if a student's work continues to be unsatisfactory after retention. In certain cases, conditional placement may be in order at a grade level to determine appropriateness. After one grading period, either retention or promotion may be in order.

**STUDENT ASSESSMENT:** To measure student progress, students will be tested in accordance with State Standards and District Policy. Unless exempted, each student will be expected to pass the appropriate Ohio Proficiency Test. Additional group tests are given to students to monitor progress and determine educational mastery levels. These tests are used to help the staff determine instructional needs.

**NON-SCHOOL SPONSORED CLUBS/ACTIVITIES:** Non school sponsored student groups organized for religious, political, or philosophical reasons may meet during non-instructional hours. The application for permission can be obtained from the office. The application must verify that students are initiating the activity, attendance is voluntary, that no school staff person is actively involved in the event, that the event will not interfere with school activities and that non-school persons do not play a regular role in the event. School rules will still apply regarding behavior and equal opportunity to participate. Membership in any fraternity, sorority, or any secret society as proscribed by law is not permitted. All groups must comply with school rules and must provide equal opportunity to participate.

**EXPLANATION OF TERMS APPLYING TO THE STUDENT DISCIPLINE CODE**

1. **AIDING OR ABETTING VIOLATION OF SCHOOL RULES** - If a student assists another student in violating any school rule they will be disciplined. Students are expected to resist peer pressure and exercise sound decision-making regarding their behavior.
2. **ASSAULTING A STAFF MEMBER, STUDENT, and/or PERSONS ASSOCIATED WITH THE DISTRICT** - Physical assault on a staff member, student, or other person associated with the District, which may or may not cause injury. Injury to staff member may result in charges being filed and subject the student to expulsion.
3. **BULLYING & AGGRESSIVE BEHAVIOR** – Harassment, intimidation or bullying behavior by any student/school personnel in the Canal Winchester Local School District is strictly prohibited and such conduct may result in disciplinary action, including suspension and/or expulsion

from school. "Harassment, intimidation or bullying", in accordance with House Bill 276, means any intentional written, verbal, graphic or physical act including electronically transmitted assistant (PDA), or wireless hand-held device, either toward another student/school personnel with the intent to harass, intimidate, injure, threaten, ridicule, or humiliate. Such behaviors are prohibited on or immediately adjacent to school grounds, at any school-sponsored activity or on school provided transportation that a reasonable person under the circumstances should know would have the effect of:

- A. Causing mental or physical harm to the other student/school personnel including placing an individual in reasonable fear of physical harm and/or damaging of students' personal property; and
  - B. Is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that it creates an intimidating, threatening, or abusive educational environment of the other student/school personnel.
4. **AGGRESSIVE BEHAVIOR** is defined as inappropriate conduct that is repeated enough, or serious enough, to negatively impact a student's educational, physical, or emotional well being. This type of behavior is a form of intimidation and harassment, although it need not be based on any of the legally protected characteristics, such as sex, race, color, national origin, marital status, or disability. It would include, but not be limited to, such behaviors as stalking, bullying/cyber-bullying, intimidating, menacing, coercion, name-calling, taunting, making threats, and hazing.
  5. **CRIMINAL ACTS** - Any criminal acts taken at or related to the school will be reported to law enforcement officials as well as disciplined by the school. It is not considered double jeopardy (being tried twice for the same crime), when school rules and the law are violated. Certain criminal acts may result in permanent exclusion.
  6. **DAMAGING PROPERTY** - Vandalism and disregard for school property will not be tolerated.
  7. **DISCIPLINE - STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES** - Students with disabilities will be entitled to the right and procedures afforded by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and the American with Disabilities Act (ADA), or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
  8. **DISPLAYS OF AFFECTION** - Students demonstrating affection between each other that is personal. This includes holding hands, or any contact that may be considered affectionate or sexual in nature.
  9. **DISOBEDIENCE** - School staff is acting "in loco parents" which means they are allowed, by law, to direct a student as a parent would. This applies to **all** staff, not just teachers assigned to a student. If given a reasonable direction by a staff member, the student is expected to comply. Chronic disobedience can result in expulsion.
  10. **DISORDER/DEMONSTRATION** - Students will not be denied their rights to freedom of expression. However, the disruption of any school activity will not be allowed, and the expression may not infringe on the rights of others. If a student or students feel there is need to organize some form of demonstration, they are encouraged to contact the principal to discuss the proper way to plan such an activity.
  11. **DISRUPTION OF THE EDUCATIONAL PROCESS** - Any actions or manner of dress that interfere with school activities and disrupt the educational process are unacceptable. Such disruptions also include delay or prevention of lessons, assemblies, field trips, athletic and performing arts events.
  12. **DRUG USE** - The school has a "Drug Free" zone that extends 1000 feet beyond the boundaries of the school grounds as well as to any school activity and transportation.

- This means that any activity related to drugs - sale, distribution, or use of drugs, alcohol, fake drugs, steroids, inhalants, or look-alike drugs is prohibited. If caught, the student could be suspended or expelled and law enforcement officials may be contacted. The sale, distribution, possession, or use of drugs, alcohol, fake drugs, steroids, inhalants, look-alike drugs or drug paraphernalia is prohibited. This includes non-alcoholic beers and wines, steroids, and the like. Many drug abuse offenses are also felonies.
13. **EXPLOSIVES** - Explosives, fireworks and chemical-reaction objects such as smoke bombs, small firecrackers, and poppers are forbidden and dangerous.
  14. **EXTORTION** - Extortion is the use of threat, intimidation, force or deception to take, or receive something from someone else. Extortion is against the law.
  15. **FALSIFICATION OF SCHOOL WORK, FORGERY OF IDENTITY** - Forgery of passes and excuses as well as false ID's are forms of lying and are not acceptable. Plagiarism and cheating are also forms of falsification and subject the student to academic penalties as well as disciplinary action.
  16. **FALSE ALARMS AND FALSE REPORTS** - A false emergency alarm or report endangers the safety forces that are responding, the citizens of the community and the persons in the building. What may seem like a prank, is a dangerous stunt that is against the law.
  17. **GAMBLING** - Gambling includes casual betting, betting pools, organized sports betting and other forms of wagering. Students who bet on an activity in which they are involved may also be banned from that activity.
  18. **HARASSMENT** - The school believes that every individual deserves to be able to come to school without fear of demeaning remarks or actions. The harassment of other students or members of staff, or any other individuals is not permitted. This includes any speech or action that creates a hostile, intimidating, or offensive learning environment. Conduct constituting harassment may take different forms including but not limited to the following: sexual, gender, ethnic, religious and disability harassment. Reference Board of Education Policy 5517
  19. **PERMANENT EXCLUSION** - When a student, 16 years of age or older, is being considered for permanent exclusion, it is possible that s/he will never be permitted to return to school anywhere in the state of Ohio. A permanent exclusion may be considered if the student is convicted or adjudicated delinquent for committing on or more of the following crimes while on the property of any Ohio school: any possession or involvement with a deadly weapon; drug trafficking; murder, manslaughter, assault or aggravated assault; certain sexual offenses and; complicity in any of the above crimes. This formal process will usually follow an expulsion and proper notification of parents.
  20. **PERSISTENT ABSENCE OR TARDINESS**- Attendance laws require students to be in school all day or have a legitimate excuse. It is also important to establish consistent attendance habits in order to succeed in school and in the world of work. Penalties can range from detention to a referral to court and/or revocation of the student's driver's license.
  21. **POSSESSION OF ELECTRONIC EQUIPMENT** - The school supplies most electronic equipment necessary in school. Students are not allowed to use radios, portable TV's, "boom-boxes", pagers, cellular telephones, etc. without the permission of the principal. The property will be confiscated and disciplinary action will be taken.
  22. **PURPOSELY SETTING A FIRE** - Anything, such as fire, that endangers school property and its occupants will not be tolerated. Arson is a felony and will subject the student to expulsion.
  23. **REFUSING TO ACCEPT DISCIPLINE** - The school may use informal discipline to prevent the student from being removed from school. When a student refuses to accept the usual discipline for an infraction, the refusal can result in a sterner action.
  24. **THEFT** - When a student is caught stealing school or someone's property, s/he will be disciplined and may be reported to law enforcement officials. Students are discouraged from bringing to school anything of value that is not needed for learning. The school is not responsible for personal property.
  25. **TOBACCO USE** - Smoking and other tobacco uses are a danger to a student's health and to the health of others. The school prohibits the sale, distribution, use, or possession of any form of tobacco during school time or at any school activity. This prohibition also applies when going to and from school and at school bus stops.
  26. **TREPASSING** - Although schools are public facilities, the law allows a school to restrict access on school property. When a student has been removed, suspended, expelled, or permanently excluded, the student is not allowed on school property without authorization of the principal.
  27. **UNAUTHORIZED USE OF SCHOOL OR PRIVATE PROPERTY** - Students are expected to obtain permission to use any school property or any private property located on school premises. Any unauthorized use shall be subject to disciplinary action.
  28. **VERBAL THREATS TO STAFF MEMBERS, STUDENTS, and/or PERSONS ASSOCIATED WITH THE DISTRICT** - Any statement or action that a staff member, student, or other person associated with the District feels to be a threat will be considered a verbal assault as well profanity directed toward a staff member is a threatening tone.
  29. **VIOLATION OF INDIVIDUAL CLASSROOM AND SCHOOL RULES** - Each learning environment has different rules for students. Individual rules are for the safe and orderly operation of that environment. Students will be oriented to specific rules, all of which will be consistent with the policy of the school.
  30. **WEAPON POSSESSION** - A weapon includes conventional objects like guns, pellet guns, knives, metal knuckles, straight razors, explosives, noxious irritation gases, poisons, drugs, or club type implements. It may also include any toy that is presented as a real weapon or reacted to as a real weapon or an object converted from its original use to an object used to threaten or injure another. This includes, but is not limited to padlocks, pens, pencils, chairs, jewelry, and so on. Criminal charges may be filed for this violation. Possession of a weapon will subject a student to expulsion and possible permanent exclusion.

**SCOPE OF JURISDICTION AND FIRST WARNING:**

This code of conduct is in effect while students are under the authority of school personnel or involved in any school activity. This includes but is not limited to school buses and property under the control of school authorities, and while at interscholastic competitions, extracurricular events, or other school activities or programs. In addition, this Code of Conduct includes: 1) misconduct by a student that occurs off school district property but is connected to activities or incidents that have occurred on school district property; and 2) misconduct by a student that, regardless of where it occurs, is directed at a district official or employee or the property of an official or employee. **Student possession of these rules constitutes a first warning. No further warnings will be given.**

**BOARD OF EDUCATION'S POSITION ON STUDENT CONDUCT AS PER OHIO REVISED CODE 3313.661**

Respect for law and for those persons in authority shall be expected of all students. This includes conformity to school rules as well as general provision of laws affecting students. Respect for the rights of others, consideration of their

privileges and cooperative citizenship shall also be expected of all members of the school community.

Respect for real and personal property, pride in one's work achievement within the range of one's ability and display of personal standards of courtesy, decency and honesty shall be maintained in the schools of the district.

The Board of Education acknowledges that conduct is closely related to learning. An effective instructional program requires an orderly school environment and the effectiveness of the educational program is, in part, reflected in the behavior of students.

The Board believes that the best discipline is self-imposed and that students should learn to assume responsibility for their own behavior and the consequences of their actions.

The rules and provisions of the Student Code of Conduct shall govern student conduct. The Board shall require each student of this district to adhere to the Code of Conduct developed by the administration and to submit to such disciplinary measures as are appropriately assigned for infraction of those rules. Such rules shall require that students:

- Conform to reasonable standards of socially acceptable behavior
- Respect the person and property
- Preserve the degree of order necessary to the educational program in which they are engaged
- Respect the rights of others
- Obey constituted authority and respond to those who hold that authority

#### **Definitions of Counterfeit Controlled Substances**

1. A controlled substance is any drug, compound, mixture of substances included in Schedule I, II, III, IV or V (Ohio Administrative Code 4729-11). Included in these schedules are narcotics such as amphetamines, depressants and hallucinogens.
2. Any drug that bears or whose container or label bears a trademark, trade name or other identifying mark.
3. Any unmarked or unlabeled substance that is represented to be a controlled substance manufactured, processed, packed or distributed by a person other than the person who manufactured, processed, packed or distributed it.
4. Any substance that is represented to be a controlled substance because of its similarity in shape, size and color or is a different controlled substance.
5. Any substance other than a controlled substance because of its similarity in shape, size and color or its markings, labeling, packaging, distribution or the price for which it is sold or offered for sale.

#### **The Law on Counterfeit Drugs**

1. No person shall knowingly possess any counterfeit controlled substance.
2. No person shall knowingly make, sell, and offer to sell or deliver any substance that is a counterfeit controlled substance.
3. No person shall make, possess, sell offer to sell or deliver any punch, die, plate, stone or other device knowing or having a reason to know that it will be used to print or reproduce a trademark, trade name or other identifying mark upon a counterfeit controlled substance.

4. No person shall sell, offer to sell, give or deliver any counterfeit controlled substance to a person under the age of eighteen (18).
5. No person shall directly or indirectly represent a counterfeit controlled substance as a controlled substance by describing its effects as the physical effects associated with use of a controlled substance.
6. No person shall directly or indirectly falsely represent a counterfeit controlled substance as a controlled substance.

#### **Search and Seizure**

Search of a student and his/her possessions, including vehicles, may be conducted at any time the student is under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education, if there is a reasonable suspicion that the student is in violation of law or school rules (Policy 5771). A search may also be conducted to protect the safety of others. All searches may be conducted with or without a student's consent.

Students are provided lockers, desks and other equipment including computer/network in which to store materials. It should be clearly understood that this equipment is the property of the school and may be searched at any time if there is reasonable suspicion that a student has violated the law or school rules. Locks are to prevent theft, not to prevent searches.

Anything that is found in the course of the search that may be evidence of a violation of school rules or the law may be taken and held or turned over to the police. The school reserves the right not to return items which have been confiscated.
